Pleasanton City Council Prioritizes Two-Year Workplan

Two-year workplan will serve as guide to the City

Every two years, the City Council presents a draft two-year workplan and asks for public input prior to making a final decision. The council approved the workplan in 2017 after receiving many emails and input from many residents at a recent workshop.

The priorities are organized into a dozen categories, representing more than 90 projects that range from the practical to the

Over the past 20 years, the Pleasanton City Council has adopted workplans to inform the community of the council's shared vision, and to provide the city manager with direction to allocate city resources. The recently adopted city priorities will serve as our guide for the next two years to help us provide those things that our community has deemed important.

A few specific examples include finalizing the development and construction of Kottinger Gardens, the City's affordable housing development for seniors; updating the Pedestrian and Bicycle Master Plan to reflect our community's desires to improve



opportunities for pedestrians and bicyclists. and conducting a retail market analysis to remain competitive.


BIG THINGS HAPPENING AT LIBRARY

In addition to planning for a new library and getting new computers and kiosks, the library staff recently updated its strategic plan with a five-year vision and a new mission statement: Start Your Journey Here: Discover, Connect, Share. To celebrate everything that is going on at the library these days, library staff announced a contest to design a new library card and everyone is invited to participate (see details at left). Civic Center/Library Master Plan Update

A proposal for a new civic center, which comprises a new City Hall, library and police station, was submitted to the City Council in November 2016. The proposal, an outcome of the Civic Center/Library Master Plan Task Force, includes a vision for new civic center facilities adjacent to the Bernal Community Park, a site that had been previously identified by voters for a performing arts

The task force met for more than a year before submitting its master plan, which provides background on previous civic center planning efforts, presents some conceptual design alternatives and describes future steps. While the City Council accepted the task force report in November, there are additional steps that must be taken before any final decisions are made on whether to move forward with the master plan.

First, the Downtown Specific Plan process, now underway, will determine what the community would like on the current downtown civic center site should the facilities be moved to the Bernal property. It is unlikely that there would be broad support for the move unless the community



deemed the replacement land uses a benefit for downtown, as well as for the overall

Second, the proposal to replace the previously planned performing arts center would require a vote of our residents, which could occur in November 2018 or later. Voter approval would also be needed on amendments to the Bernal Property Specific Plan and any financing proposals.

If you haven't yet had the chance, please stop by the library at 400 Old Bernal Ave. and take a look at the model, the design of which is based on the task force recommendation. puters available for checkout, in addition to the desktop computers, and they have all been upgraded and outfitted with the complete Microsoft Office suite, courtesy of the Friends of the Pleasanton Public Library. And to top it off, printing has been made easier and is available from all library computers, as well as from wireless personal devices.

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LPFD Turns Twenty!


The Livermore-Pleasanton Fire Department minute and carrying 500 gallons of water. recently celebrated turning twenty! Adding to the excitement was the arrival of two new fire engines which have found new homes in Pleasanton at Fire Station 4 (Bernal Avenue) and Fire Station 5 (Ruby Hill).

The fire engines were shipped from Wisconsin and these Pierce Quantum pumpers have a number of new safety features to better protect firefighters and the public.

These new fire engines are capable of pumping up to 1500 gallons of water per

They also have vehicle extrication equipment, EMS equipment and over 1500' of various types and sizes of fire hose.

The old Station 5 Engine was retired and sent to auction, but the Station 4 Engine still has a little life left in it before being put out to pasture and will be on call for the LPFD as a reserve engine. Livermore also added a new fire engine at Fire Station 8, all of which means that most of LPFD's frontline fleet will be equipped with the latest technology to better serve our community.



Mobile App Connects Police and Community



Free smartphone app allows citizens to submit tips, get alerts and stay connected to police

We take great pride in providing a safe community and recognize that feeling safe is of paramount importance. And thanks to a new mobile app, you can be even more connected to the police department. With this new tool, anyone with an Apple or Android device can submit crime tips and receive alerts, as well as access the police department's social media feeds and more. One unique feature is the property inventory function: it allows users to create an inventory of their property, complete with pictures, which can aid recovery efforts in the unfortunate event of a theft.

And while users can submit tips (anonymously and otherwise), the app is not intended to replace 911, which is still the first number people should call in the event of an emergency or a crime in

One of the primary goals of community policing is finding new ways to connect to the members of our community. This app offers yet another way for people to engage with and access the police department through their smart phone.

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Pleasanton Pavement Management Program

Paving the War

Fixing potholes and paving streets is only one of the many services provided by our engineering department. The care and maintenance of the more than 500 lane miles within the City of Pleasanton is a complex and ongoing process and this summer, City crews will be performing the necessary work on those stretches of roadway most in need.

A lot of thought and effort goes into the process to determine how to spend available funding, which comes from a variety of sources: the City's General Fund, gas taxes, Measure B, Measure BB, vehicle registration fees and a One Bay Area federal grant. This year alone, the City will spend approximately \$5 million on more than 4.8 million square feet of existing surface streets. Currently, there are more than 1,300 sections of roadway that are continuously inspected over a rolling two-year period. Each section is assigned a number, from zero to 100; this rating system, known as the Pavement Condition Index (PCI), helps determine which sections get what work done and in what order. The latest PCI rating for City streets overall was very good,

with a rating of 80, and Pleasanton's overall PCI rating is the third highest in Alameda County behind only Piedmont and Dublin.

Now that you have a better understanding of the methodology and framework of Pleasanton's Pavement Management Program, we hope you are as proud of our street crews as we are.

Bring Your Own Bags

A friendly reminder to let Pleasanton residents know the plastic bag ban, enacted in 2013 in Alameda County, recently expanded on May 1 to include all retail stores within the county. The impact since its inception has been significant, with a 44 percent decrease in plastic bags found in county storm drains, according to StopWaste.org.
