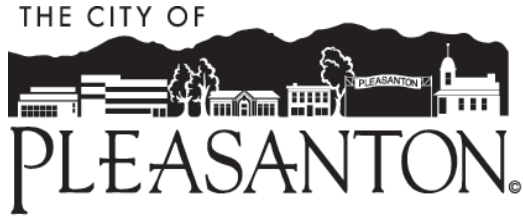

CALL TO ORDER

Vice Chairperson Bowers called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m.

Pledge of Allegiance

The Pledge of Allegiance to the flag was recited.

Roll Call

MINUTES

1. Approve regular meeting minutes of January 11, 2018

A motion was made by Commissioner Streng, seconded by Commissioner Fields, to approve the minutes of the January 11, 2018 meeting. **The motion was approved unanimously.**

MEETING OPEN TO THE PUBLIC

MATTERS BEFORE THE COMMISSION

4. Review the Proposed Pesticides Posting Pilot Program.

Mr. Stewart noted that in 2016 staff from the Pleasanton Parks Division presented information to the Parks and Recreation Commission pertaining to the use of pesticides in City owned public spaces, and since then several residents have commented on the possibility of establishing a pesticide posting program so they can be aware of when pesticides are being used in parks. He advised that staff has put together information for a Pesticide Posting Pilot Program for the Commission to review and provide comment.

Commissioners were advised by Mr. Stewart that staff follows Best Management Practices (BMP's) together with the City's Integrated Pest Management Policy with regard to proper mixing, loading, and application of all pesticides used within the City of Pleasanton. Additionally, he provided information about quantities and dilution of pesticides used, treated areas being shown with dye colorings, and length of time before reuse of areas.

Mr. Stewart reviewed with Commissioners the Draft Notice staff is proposing be posted informing the community of dates/times of pesticide use, the parks that will be included in the Pilot Program, and the staff suggested time-frame for postings to remain in place. He then asked the Commission to provide their comments and input.

Commissioner Fields asked about spraying pesticides three times in a three-month period and the times that staff is recommending that the notices be posted. She

expressed concern about people not reading the notices and others going to parks before completion of the 24-hour time-frame.

Commissioner Keshav discussed with Mr. Stewart other ways of notifying people about pesticide use in the parks. Mr. Stewart advised that staff will continue to research other ways of letting the public know about pesticide use.

Commissioner Wahl discussed dissipation of pesticides with Mr. Stewart and whether there was a time-frame at which the pesticide does not become an issue. Mr. Stewart indicated that once the pesticide has dried on the plant, exposure is greatly reduced, however, if the plant is eaten a problem could occur. He commented on the amount of chemical used and the dilution made with water. Commissioner Wahl stated that she was trying to ascertain what the postings will mean to people reading them and whether they would just inform people that the City has sprayed the area with pesticides. Mr. Stewart advised that this will be a way of letting people know that spraying has been done and they then have option of going to another park.

Vice-Chair Bowers commented on the posting being informational and Mr. Stewart indicated that more information could be included. He also felt that more important public education was needed to inform people on what the does city does, such as the dye used in areas that have been sprayed.

The meeting was opened for public comment.

Vicki LaBarge – indicated that she lives close to Mission Hills Park. She discussed pesticide reform and a recent newspaper article that commented on ramifications from the use of chemicals such as Roundup and other alternatives, such as vinegar and salt, that can be used. Ms. LaBarge suggested: 1) that if postings could be left up for at least 2-3 days more, people would be made aware of the spraying that has taken place, and 2) that all city parks eventually be brought into the program so everyone can become informed. She felt there was no reason to expose people to unhealthy elements and a city-wide program would be great.

Jenifer Flynn – stated that she has spoken to many parents about the use of pesticides. She liked the signs that the Commission was considering and believes they will be a tremendous benefit to parents, kids and pets. Ms. Flynn commented on: 1) signs needing to be posted for a longer period; 2) chemical toxicity that can be harmful after pesticides have dried on plans; 3) make signs red so they are more visible, and 4) a similar program that being considered for Hearst Elementary School.

The meeting was closed for public comment.

Commissioner Keshav and Vice-Chair Bowers discussed with Mr. Stewart the possibility of postings remaining in place for a longer time-frame.

Commissioner Streng thanked staff for taking the time to explore this matter, advising that it was an item brought to this Commission by members of the community. He then provided the following comments: 1) he would not suggest having red postings, because the signs are supposed to be informative and red is a “threatening” color; 2) he agrees with the suggestions that the posting be left in place for a longer period, and suggested 24-48 hours; 3) thought the postings could be simplified and friendlier, using the heading “We’ve Sprayed” rather than “NOTICE”; and 4) liked the idea of having postings in five parks initially.

Commissioner Wahl agreed with Commissioner Streng’s comments, especially keeping the postings in place for up to 48-hours. Commissioner Deckert also agreed, and like the idea of using more friendly language. He stated he understood the hardship for staff in having to returned later to remove signs but felt this would be better for the community.

Vice-Chair Bowers discussed with Mr. Stewart the logistics for extending the time-frame for posting signs. Mr. Stewart agreed that he could concede to this request, but didn’t want to lose any credibility by leaving signs up too long. Commissioner Fields commented on signs that might be removed by children if they are left in place for longer periods of time.

Commissioner Fields asked about the use of dry pesticides and questioned how long it takes staff to spray a large sports area like Bernal. Mr. Stewart provided information about spraying Bernal and indicated dry pesticides are typically used in landscape beds.

Vice-Chair Bowers liked the proposed Pesticide Posting Pilot Program for the five recommended parks, with suggested improvements being made to the signs, and signs be left in place for at least 24-48 hours. He suggested staff try to keep a record of how many signs disappear.

A motion was made by Commissioner Streng, seconded by Commissioner Deckert, to accept the staff Proposed Pesticide Posting Pilot Program with the Commission’s comments regarding sign improvements and time for signs to be left in place and continuing to move forward to bring to all City owned parks/public spaces.

Commissioner Streng commented on an intent and support of the Commission to have one park pesticide-free, but no specific park had been selected.

5. Parks Projects Status Report for October – December 2017

Mr. Gruber reviewed with Commissioners the Parks Projects Status Report for October-December 2017.

Lions Wayside and DeLucchi Parks – no movement has been made on this project.

Commissioner Wahl questioned if there would be a point-in-time that this project might move forward without covering the ditch. Mr. Gruber advised that staff is still working with ACE, California Fish and Wildlife, and the Regional Water Quality Control Board on a design solution that everyone could accept. He commented on the possibility that something might be done without impacting the creek, but at this time there is nothing to report.

Commissioner Deckert discussed with Mr. Gruber that possibility of work being done on the bandstand.

Tennis and Community Park – The tennis court surfacing, planting, irrigation and remaining improvements were completed in November-December, 2017.

Commissioners asked about a ribbon-cutting for this facility and Ms. Andrade-Wax advised that city staff had decided to move forward with a quiet event because of the community involvement in this project.

Commissioner Deckert was provided information by Mr. Gruber on the city's selection of the low-bidder for this project.

Pleasanton Pioneer Cemetery – Commissioners were advised by Mr. Gruber that the construction contract was awarded by City Council on November 7, 2017 to Ghera Construction and a Pre-Construction meeting took place on November 29, 2017. Rough grading was completed in December 2017 and footings have been poured for the fencing.

Commissioner Streng questioned whether Mr. Gruber had visited the Dublin Cemetery and looked at the informational signs that they have posted. He felt these were an interesting addition to the cemetery and something that should be added to the Pleasanton Pioneer Cemetery. Ms. Andrade-Wax noted that this and a phone app was something already indicated in the Master Plan for the cemetery. Mr. Gruber added that site improvements that includes signage and interpretative signs are in Phase 3 of the project which is just beginning.

Commissioner Wahl felt that signs and a phone app will provide much additional information about the cemetery. Mr. Gruber stated that the ability to include interpretative panels will be available and staff is working with the Museum on Main to obtain information.

Harding Park – the playground installation had some design issues due to the use zone, so the play area footprint was reconstructed during December 2017. Mr. Stewart advised that some items on the 2-5-year-old playground still need fixing so the area has been fenced off for safety reasons.

Commissioner Fields questioned whether Mr. Harding's wife would be invited to the grand opening for this park.

Commissioner Deckert had questions regarding naming of parks and information about the process was provided by Ms. Andrade-Wax.

Valley Trails Park – no movement on this project.

Trails Master Plan – Mr. Gruber advised that he has spent time working with the consultant and a site analysis was conducted on many of the existing and proposed trails. A 3-5:00 p.m. hike is planned for February 13, 2018.

Old Vineyard Avenue Trail – Trail concrete improvements that included new sidewalk, curb, and gutter at the trail/street intersections, were installed November/December 2017. The project is getting close to opening.

Garms Staging Area - Commissioner Wahl asked about meetings with the Commission on the Garms project. Ms. Andrade-Wax advised that Mr. Fiahlo will be bringing the Liaison Committee together again on work on this.

Castleridge Trailhead – Concrete, irrigation, a drinking fountain, trees, bollards, and a bike rack are expected to be installed prior to the planned March 10, 2018 trail opening.

Miscellaneous Park Projects – 1) Renovation of Three Playgrounds – the ADA ramp and curb are in. A concrete repair was needed after a crack occurred bringing in playground equipment; 2) Basketball Court Replacements - the City hired one of their on-call consultants to evaluate the renovation options, so a biddable construction plan can be prepared for the courts based on budget and recommendations; 3) Cricket Pitch in Sports Park – Cricket for Cubs and the City are working on a final design solution that will be agreeable to all parties.

6. Parks Maintenance Division Quarterly Status Report for October – December 2017

Mr. Stewart reviewed with the Commission the Parks Maintenance Division Quarterly Status Report for October-December 2017.

Alviso Adobe Community Park – in collaboration with Community Services staff contracted to install a new roof on the Adobe building.

Harvest Park – removed and replaced existing playground structure and kids are loving the new spinner that was installed.

Ken Mercer Sports Park – a new warm-up pitching area was installed at Little League field five.

Trails and Open Space – new trash racks were installed at various locations along the Augustin Bernal Trail, because of problems some work still needs to be done.

Roadway Median Areas – hydro seeded bio swales along Vineyard, Sterling Greens, Laguna Creek and Valley Avenue. Planted 650 new plants along the Bernal/680 corridor. Installed 1,600 sq. ft of fine fescue sod on the Bernal underpass.

City Facilities – new plantings and mulch were added to the Pleasanton Library entrance planters.

Other work included: tree removal, planting of new trees and bulbs, installation of tennis court nets, irrigation valve replacement, fence repair, gate installation, and concrete replacement.

Commissioners Fields and Deckert commented on bathrooms that need cleaning at Bernal Community Park and Moller Ranch. Mr. Stewart indicated that he would inform the contractor responsible for taking care of these facilities that they need to be cleaned.

COMMISSION REPORTS

7. Committee Meetings
 - A. Bicycle, Pedestrian and Trails Committee – No report.
 - B. Community of Character – Commissioner Fields provided information about the Fellowship Breakfast that took place on January 22 and the scholarships that were awarded to two Amador Valley High School students and two Foothill High School students. She also advised that 40 non-profits will be participating in the Make A Difference Day event.
 - C. City/East Bay Regional Park District Liaison Committee – no report.
 - D. Heritage Tree Review Board – Commissioner Streng provided information about an appeal made for removal of a large redwood tree in the front of a home that was close to PG&E lines. The Board granted the appeal.
 - E. Public Art Selection Sub-Committee – Commissioner Fields provided information about a joint project with Kaiser Permanente and the City of Pleasanton for the painting of a mural on an exterior wall at the Kaiser facility. A Pleasanton artist has been selected for the project. The Sub-Committee also reviewed several utility box paintings.
 - F. Sports Council – No report.

8. Other brief reports on any meetings, conferences, and/or seminars attended by the Commission members,

COMMISSION COMMENTS

Commissioner Fields said her goodbye to Ms. Andrade-Wax and stated she had enjoyed working with her.

Vice-Chair Bowers also thanked Ms. Andrade-Wax for her services and for explaining and answering the many questions of members of the Commission. Commissioner Streng said it had been a pleasure and a joy working with Ms. Andrade-Wax and had enjoyed her passion for helping to make and maintain Pleasanton the wonderful place that it is. He commented on the stunning achievements she was able to make during her tenure with Pleasanton.

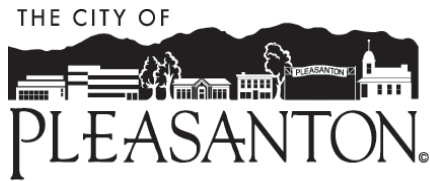

**SUBJECT: LEGAL GUIDANCE FOR PUBLIC MEETING PROCEDURES
AND COMMISSION SERVICE**

SUMMARY

Overview of California law, the Pleasanton Municipal Code, and the *Commissioner's Handbook* regarding public meeting procedures and commission service.

RECOMMENDATION

That the Commission receive information, ask any questions, and discuss.

FINANCIAL STATEMENT

None.

BACKGROUND

The Parks and Recreation Commission is one of eleven city committees and commissions where local residents or business owners serve as advisors to the City Council, or as final decision makers for specific matters.

California law subjects such advisory boards to California open meeting laws (also known as the Brown Act).¹ And, the council has reinforced such open meeting procedures by incorporating those provisions in the Municipal Code and *Commissioner's Handbook*.

DISCUSSION

California Open Meeting laws. A “meeting” subject to open meeting laws is defined as any congregation of a majority of the members of the commission at the same time and place to hear, discuss, deliberate or take action on any item that is within its subject matter jurisdiction. Even though that definition has a physical focus, the Brown Act also prohibits a majority of the commission, outside of an open and noticed meeting, from using a series of communications of any kind (e.g. emails, phone calls, etc.), directly with each other or through intermediaries, to discuss, deliberate, or take action on any item within its subject matter jurisdiction.

The law has exceptions for when a majority of the commissioners attend an open community meeting, as well as social or ceremonial gatherings.

Individual contacts by commissioners with staff, or discussions with residents or other community members, is also permitted, and not defined as a “meeting”.

Meetings must be publicly noticed, and action can only occur on items listed on the agenda. The process for a commissioner, or member of the public, to suggest adding an item to a future agenda is described in the *Commissioner's Handbook* (see pages 31 and 33).

At every meeting, the public must be provided the opportunity to speak regarding any item on the agenda, as well as address the commission on any topic within its subject matter jurisdiction even if not listed on the agenda. The latter would be during the Meeting Open to the Public / Public Comment portion of your agenda.

Commission Duties - Municipal Code. Municipal Code §2.32.010 sets forth the duties of the Parks and Recreation Commission. The council may also add tasks, or the commission can suggest items when recommending priorities to the council.

Attendance and Quorum. A quorum is comprised of three commissioners who are allowed to vote.²

Attendance is tabulated every six months. If a commissioner is absent from one-third of the regular meetings during a six-month period, the commissioner can be subject to removal (though the commissioner may submit reasons for absences to the council, which can determine if the absences are justified).³

Meeting Procedures – Commissioner’s Handbook.

Following the order of the agenda, commission meetings should generally follow the procedures described in the *Commissioner’s Handbook*,⁴ as facilitated by the chairperson and staff. This includes a discussion of public hearing procedures, comments by the public, rules of debate, and voting procedures. While parliamentary motions are described, the chairperson has discretion to preserve order, and strict adherence to such parliamentary procedures is not required.

SUMMARY

Members of the Parks and Recreation Commission provide the mayor and council with detailed recommendations regarding community interests relating to local recreational services, as well as physical park facilities. As public officials, commissioners are subject to state and local laws and rules regarding such public service, including the conduct of public meetings.

The Municipal Code in §2.32.070.B does state that “The commission shall conduct its meetings and business in accordance with the Pleasanton city council’s adopted “rules and operating procedures,” as said rules and procedures are amended from time to time.” This section of the Municipal Code was added in 2001 by Ordinance No. 1819. The referenced City Council Rules and Operating Procedures were most recently revised in Dec. 1995. Given that the *Commissioner’s Handbook* is much more current, you should use the *Commissioner’s Handbook* as your reference.

SUBJECT: RELOCATION OF CRICKET PITCH AT KEN MERCER SPORTS PARK

SUMMARY

The installation of a cricket pitch was approved by the Parks and Recreation Commission at its February 9, 2017 meeting. During the pre-construction phase and field allocation process, it was determined that the location of a permanent youth cricket pitch would be more suitable on Sports Field 12 instead of Sports Field 2 at Ken Mercer Sports Park.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Parks and Recreation Commission approve the proposed relocation site for a permanent cricket pitch from Ken Mercer Sports Park Field 2 to Ken Mercer Sports Park Field 12.

FINANCIAL STATEMENT

The City Manager's office will work with the Cricket for Cubs organization to negotiate costs associated with construction and installation.

BACKGROUND

In 2015, representatives of the Pleasanton Cricket for Cubs organization met with City staff to discuss the growing popularity of cricket in the Tri-Valley area and their desire to have a cricket pitch located at one of the City's parks. The Cricket for Cubs organization currently has over 75 youth participants (ages 7 – 15) who reside in Pleasanton, and also coordinate winter and spring leagues involving multiple middle schools in the Tri-Valley area. The organization's board and coaches have also worked with the physical education staff at Harvest Park Middle School to make a modified version of cricket a part of school's curriculum. Program participants currently conduct weekly practices on the blacktop at Harvest Park Middle School and in the batting cages at the Ken Mercer Sports Park. League games are played at Emerald Glen Park in Dublin, and both Windermere Ranch Middle School and Monarch Park in San Ramon.

On January 9, 2017, the proposed project was discussed and endorsed by the Pleasanton Sports Council at their meeting.

At its February 9, 2017 meeting, the Parks and Recreation Commission approved the installation of a cricket pitch in the area between girls' softball fields 3 and 7, also noted as sports field 2.

During the pre-construction process, it was determined that the installation of a cricket pitch in the area between the two football fields, also noted as sports field 12 would be a more suitable location. The relocation would provide an opportunity for regular dedicated field space to the Cricket for Cubs program with less impact to adjacent sports fields and co-sponsored groups.

DISCUSSION

The proposed project includes:

- Replacing a 9' x 98' 6" section of turf in the area between the two football fields, also noted as sports field 12
- Adding a synthetic turf surface over the new concrete pad

The proposed cricket pitch relocation will not impact the existing use of space for other sports, as football practices and games can be conducted on either side of the proposed cricket pitch.

It is anticipated that the City's co-sponsored group, Pleasanton Junior Football League (PJFL), would use the football fields, also noted as Sports Field 12, during the summer and fall seasons. The City's co-sponsored Cricket for Cubs program would use the cricket pitch located within Sports Field 12 during the spring season. In addition, the Cricket for Cubs program could apply for use during other times of the year when not in use by the PJFL organization. All uses would be regulated by field allocations and via field use permit through the Community Services Department.

The City Manager's office will work with the Cricket for Cubs organization to negotiate costs associated with construction and installation, which is estimated to cost approximately \$51,000. City staff will manage the project, including bids and construction management. If the relocation is approved by the Commission, construction is expected to take place in June 2018.

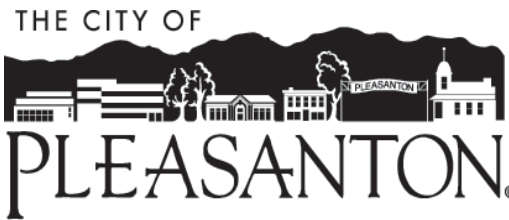
