# Letter from the City Manager

# **GERRY BEAUDIN**

Dear Pleasanton residents

No matter how you are staying informed about issues on the November ballot, I want us to do our part at the City of Pleasanton to provide direct access to facts and information to help you make informed decisions, particularly on issues that directly affect Pleasanton.

You may have heard the City has a structural budget deficit. Simply put, city revenues are no longer keeping up with expenses. Operating costs are rising, and employee pension obligations are also a contributing factor. However, rising costs to maintain and replace aging infrastructure, vehicles, and facilities, insurance premiums, utility bills, unfunded state mandates, and other legal requirements that the City is responsible for also contribute to the problem.

Cities across the East Bay and the State have been engaging in similar conversations about their quality of life and the services they expect from their city governments. Many have discovered, as we have, that California's funding system for cities, particularly older cities with aging infrastructure and cities providing a wide range of services, is not working well.

City leaders have raised this issue often over the past year. To ensure we proactively address our financial challenges, the City Council has already cut millions of dollars from our General Fund budget for the current fiscal year.

The bottom line is this: we do have a problem. There is no one reason why we are here and no one solution to fix it. The City continues to explore ways to deliver necessary and valued services and maintain the quality of life our community expects without more significant cuts to city services. I encourage everyone to stay informed about the City's budget position and efforts being made to address it.


### What is Measure PP?

Measure PP is a City of Pleasanton-sponsored proposal on the November ballot for a half-cent (1/2%) sales tax increase to help maintain the local quality of life.

If approved by voters, funds generated by Measure PP would go to essential public services, like public safety, disaster preparedness, and 911 rapid response; routine improvements to aging City infrastructure, such as roads and stormwater systems; and other general government services like the library, parks and open spaces.

All Measure PP funds would be locally controlled and could not be used by the State, County, or any other agency. Independent financial audits, regular public reporting, and oversight would also be required.

#### November Election

The City of Pleasanton's general municipal election will be held on Tuesday, November 5, 2024.

### What's on the Ballot?

There are three seats to be filled this year:

- Mayor, at-large
- City Councilmember, District 2
- City Councilmember, District 4

Voters registered in Districts 2 and 4 will vote for a Councilmember candidate in their district and a Mayoral candidate. Voters registered in Districts 1 and 3 will vote for a Mayoral candidate only.

Measure PP: Pleasanton Essential Services Protection Measure. All Pleasanton voters registered will vote on this local ballot measure in addition to voting for candidates.




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### WATER PROJECTS

As part of the City's continuing effort to provide Pleasanton with safe and reliable drinking water, a number of projects are underway and planned for the near future to ensure the reliability of the distribution system and to maintain local control of our water supply. # Joint Groundwater Wells Study

The City and Zone 7 Water Agency are working together to evaluate the feasibility of installing additional groundwater wells in Pleasanton. This project is the result of a year-long Water Supply Alternatives Study conducted by the City in 2022 and 2023. The goal is to find a permanent solution for the water supply lost when Cityowned groundwater wells were taken out of service due to PFAS detection.

The project is in Phase 1, which focuses on the feasibility of building and operating new wells in areas unaffected by PFAS. Over the next few months, test wells will be drilled at Pleasanton Tennis and Community Park, Del Prado Park, and Hansen Park. These sites were chosen based on factors like City ownership, space availability, proximity to water treatment facilities, and distance from the PFAS footprint.

The test wells will gather information on water quality and yield. Drilling and testing at each site will take about four to eight weeks. During this time, park visitors may notice

drilling rigs and other equipment in a small portion of the park. Once testing is finished, a monitoring well will remain in place. More details will be shared when construction schedules are set.

# Near-Term Water Improvement Projects

### Bernal Water Line - Complete

The City has replaced nearly a half mile of pipeline with a new 18-inch water line on Bernal Avenue. between Nevada Street and Vineyard Avenue. The expanded pipeline allows for better water pressure within the system, reducing the likelihood of emergency leaks and increasing the useful life of this pipeline and others in the area.

### Turnout Renovations – In Progress

In 2023, a temporary booster station was added to Turnout 4 to help balance Pleasanton's water distribution system and increase capacity. Turnout 4 is located at the intersection of Stoneridge Drive and and Hopyard Road. Updates to the infrastructure within the turnout will be completed by early 2025 with a permanent booster station expected to be installed later in 2025. Turnout 1 is located on Santa Rita Road near Stoneridge Drive. Work to upgrade the infrastructure within the turnout will be completed by the end of October.

### Sunol Water Line – Coming Soon

The City will install a 20-inch water line on Sunol Blvd. from Bernal Avenue to Sycamore Road. Preparatory work has been completed, and construction is expected to begin before the end of 2024.

### Stoneridge Water Line – In Progress

The City will install a 24-inch water line on Stoneridge Drive from Hopyard Road to Johnson Drive Court. Work at the Stoneridge Drive and Hopyard Road intersection has been completed, and construction along Stoneridge Drive is underway. One lane is closed in the westbound direction and will remain closed until the project is complete in late October.






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## KNOW YOUR PLEASANTON PARKS:

# Augustin Bernal Park

The 237-acre Augustin Bernal Park is the crown jewel of the City of Pleasanton's park system. It is located on the Pleasanton Ridge at the highest elevation point within the city, peaking at just over 1,560 feet. From the lookout, you can capture the best view of the Tri-Valley. The park has over 7 miles of trails, including the area's only professionally designed dedicated downhill-only mountain bike trail. It connects with the East Bay Regional Park District's extensive Pleasanton Ridge trail network. It is also the city's most ecologically diverse park where one might spot the endangered Alameda whipsnake, Red-legged frog, or the mountain lion family that has recently been in the news. Plants of

interest include coffeeberry, monkey flower, California buckeye, and Chinese houses. The park was dedicated to the city by noted philanthropist Walter S. Johnson in 1971 and has two access points, with one only being available to Pleasanton residents through the Golden Eagle neighborhood (or by permit to non-residents) and the other at the top of Longview Drive. Whether you want to take in a beautiful view, relax in a natural setting, have lunch at the picnic area (which includes a public restroom), go birdwatching, horseback riding, hiking, or mountain biking, or have a place to spend time with friends or family, Augustin Bernal Park is the place to be.
