



## **Substantial Amendment to HUD FY 2025/26 Annual Action Plan**

The following is the summary of the substantial amendment to the City of Pleasanton FY 2025/26 HUD Annual Action Plan.

### **Background**

The City of Pleasanton, as an entitlement jurisdiction, is required by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) to submit a 5-Year Consolidated Plan and Annual Action Plans in order to receive annual federal Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds that the City uses to address community development needs throughout the city.

The City's Citizen Participation Plan is critical in ensuring that Pleasanton residents are provided the opportunity to provide input and comment on the Consolidated Plan and Action Plans. It also provides the following criteria for Substantial Amendments to the Action Plan:

- Changes in the use of CDBG funds from one eligible activity to another shall constitute a substantial amendment, subject to the requirements set forth under Section VIII of the Citizen Participation Plan.

### **Citizen Participation**

The 30-day public comment period for the Substantial Amendment is January 30, 2026 through March 3, 2026. The Substantial Amendment is posted on the City's website (<https://www.cityofpleasantonca.gov/our-government/housing/community-development-block-grant/>) to solicit Pleasanton residents' input and comments. A public hearing will be held at the March 3, 2026 City Council meeting to further solicit public comments and to review and approve the submission of the Substantial Amendment to HUD. **Substantial Amendment to  
FY 2025/26 Annual Action Plan**

The FY 2025/26 Annual Action Plan is substantially amended to add the Tri-Valley Haven Emergency Shelter Rebuild project and to commit \$224,630 CDBG funds to this CDBG-eligible project.

**AP-15 Expected Resources - 91.420(b), 91.220(c)(1,2)**

*\$224,630 in CDBG funds is currently unallocated and uncommitted to a CDBG-eligible capital improvement project (CIP). These funds will be allocated and committed to the Tri-Valley Haven Emergency Shelter project to financially support the project's funding gap.*

## **AP-35 Projects - 91.420, 91.220(d)**

*The CDBG-eligible activities that would be funded with the unallocated \$224,630 CDBG funds would be identified in the City's proposed Amendment to the FY 2025/26 HUD Annual Action Plan. As required by CDBG regulations, the proposed activities will meet the National Objective of benefitting low- and moderate-income persons.*

### **Introduction**

This section of the Action Plan includes the programs and activities which the City of Pleasanton will carry out to implement its Housing and Community Development Strategic Plan during FY 2025/2026.

This section describes individual activities to be funded with FY 2025/26 Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funding. The City's use of HOME funding is addressed separately under the County's section of the Consolidated Plan.

There are four (4) types of projects eligible for CDBG funds: capital improvement projects, economic development, housing, and public services. To be eligible for CDBG funding, projects must meet at least one (1) of HUD's national objectives: 1) to benefit low/moderate-income people; 2) to prevent or eliminate slums and blight; and 3) to meet an urgent community development need.

CDBG-funded projects must also pass the low- and moderate-income benefit test. A project meets this standard if at least 51% of the beneficiaries have low-moderate incomes (i.e., incomes at or below 80% of Area Median Income) or if the project benefits an area (e.g., census tracts, service area, neighborhood, etc.) with a majority of low-moderate income people. Funded projects are required to document the income levels of persons and households receiving these services.

For FY 2025/2026, the City is proposing to allocate its unallocated FY 2025/2026 CDBG funds in the following eligible funding categories: Public Facilities.

The City is providing another \$224,630 CDBG funds to this project in addition to the \$250,000 allocated fiscal year 2023/24 and another \$250,000 allocated in fiscal year 2024/25.
