

What trees are protected?

The City of Pleasanton's Tree Preservation Ordinance (Municipal Code Chapter 17.16) has protected trees since 1971. The Ordinance recognizes certain trees as "Protected Trees" and "Heritage Trees" which protects them from removal, destruction or disfigurement on both public and private property.

What is a Protected Tree?

A "Protected Tree" is defined in the Municipal Code as any non-native single-trunked tree with a minimum trunk circumference of 55 in. as measured 4-1/2 ft. above the ground, or non-native multitrunked tree with a min. trunk circumference of 55 in. when measured below the split at the narrowest point below the main attachment or base if applicable.

Protected trees also include any single-trunked native tree (species listed in code) with a minimum trunk circumference of 37 in. measured 4-1/2 ft. above the ground, or native multitrunked tree with a min. circumference of 37 in. below the split at the narrowest point below the main attachment or at the base if applicable.

What is a Heritage Tree?

A "Heritage Tree" is a tree that is considered irreplaceable due to community significance, history, size, species, or unique quality and designated by the Landscape Architecture Division. Any pruning of Heritage Trees must be done in consultation with the city's arborist and performed under the supervision of an International Society of Arboriculture (ISA) certified arborist.

Why are certain trees protected?

Some benefits trees provide include:

- Enhancement of the natural scenic beauty of Pleasanton
- Contribution to a long-term potential increase in property values
- Moderation of the effect of extreme temperatures
- Soil erosion reduction
- Help create an identity and quality, enhancing the attractiveness of Pleasanton to visitors
- Habitat value

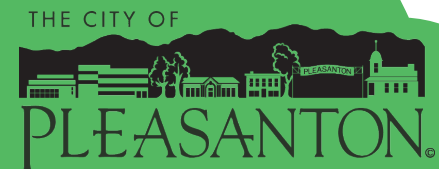

Do I need permission to remove my tree?

If your tree is a Protected Tree or Heritage Tree then you need a permit from the City to remove it.

What does the City do with my request to remove a Protected Tree or Heritage Tree?

The City Arborist will visually inspect the tree(s) and the circumstances surrounding your request. The request will be evaluated against the reasons stated in the Municipal Code section 17.16.020. A response will be provided within 2 weeks from inspection.

Can the determination be appealed?

Yes, the appeal process is described in the Tree Preservation Ordinance (Section 17.16.040).

Can the city provide financial assistance?

The property owner is responsible for trees on their property. Visit TreesAreGood.org for a list of qualified tree professionals.

What if my development requires tree removal?

The Planning Division will provide direction regarding your options. An arborist report from the City's list of approved consulting arborists and/or mitigation for tree removal may be required. For further information refer to Section 17.16.050 of the Municipal Code.

Who determines mitigation for tree removal?

The Planning and Landscape Architecture Divisions will determine appropriate mitigation based on the development application. Mitigation may include, but not be limited to, replanting, bonding, or payment to the City to fund urban forestry projects/programs within the City.

Maintenance



Can I prune my tree?

Normal maintenance/pruning of trees does not require a permit. All pruning of Protected and Heritage Trees must be in conformance with the current tree pruning standards of the International Society of Arboriculture (ISA), and must be performed under the supervision of an ISA certified arborist. Any person engaged in pruning of Protected Trees must be licensed with the California Contractors State Licensing Board and shall carry a license. Pruning of Protected and Heritage Trees that are not in conformance with the ISA standards may be cause for a civil penalty.

Can I prune a city-owned tree?

You may not prune any City-owned tree. City-owned trees are those trees typically located in the planting area between the sidewalk and street curb. City trees may be found in medians, parkways, parks and open spaces, and the historic downtown. To determine ownership you may contact the Landscape Architecture Division.

Can I prune my neighbor's tree?

The City recommends that you work with your neighbor on a mutually acceptable pruning solution. For further information please refer to California Civil Code § 3346 and California Code of Civil Procedure § 733.
